### **Indoor Navigation Is Here**

#### The Sight Center Equipped as AudibleEye Demonstration Site

Thanks to advances in technology, it is easier than ever to travel with a vision impairment. Many devices and smart phone applications can tell you where you are and how to get somewhere else, but once you enter a building it is a different story...until now!

Local entrepreneur Jarrod Witt has developed AudiblEye, a mobile application that provides blind and visually impaired individuals with indoor navigation. AudiblEye will work in buildings equipped with special bluetooth beacons.

The Sight Center will be the first fully equipped building and will serve as a demonstration site for AudiblEye. Sight Center visitors who download the app will "hear" where they are inside the building, helping them find offices, meeting rooms, restrooms, and The Shop, the new retail store at The Sight Center. According to Mr. Witt, the goal is to equip more public buildings with the AudiblEye beacons, increasing accessibility for people who are blind or visually impaired. Hospitals, airports, and college campuses are just a few examples of ideal sites for AudiblEye.

Mr. Witt, a Toledo resident and recent graduate of Bowling Green State University, initially received support for his concept at The Hatch, a BGSU "shark tank" event held during the school's Entrepreneurship Week. Prior to unveiling the official version at The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio, the prototype AudiblEye app was tested at Bowling Green State University's College of Business and at The Cleveland Sight Center.

## **The Scroggs Legacy**

Leadership That Is Making a Difference

Few board members of any nonprofit organization can make the claims that Jennifer Scroggs can about her tenure on the Board of Trustees for The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio. And, since Jennifer isn't the type of person to make those claims about herself, we would like to do it for her.

Initially drawn to The Sight Center mission by her early childhood experience of having a grandmother who was visually impaired, Jennifer joined the Board in 2007. On January 1, 2016, Jennifer began her ninth and final year on the board and earned a well-deserved break after having served an unprecedented three year stint as Board Chair.

Leading The Sight Center Board is not all she's been doing. In addition to serving on other non-profit boards, Ms. Scroggs works as Vice President of Fifth Third Private Bank Personal Trust. After work she heads home to her family, which includes her husband of eight years and her two young children, both of whom were born during her time on the board. Through it all Jennifer has never let her personal and professional commitments keep her from leading The Sight Center through the many challenges that have arisen.



Her leadership as Vice Chair and Chair of the Board helped The Sight Center develop new funding sources in response to major decreases from traditional funding partners including the State of Ohio and United Way of Greater Toledo. New collaborations began with the Cleveland Sight Center and Interlink, an agency that serves people who are deaf that now resides in The Sight Center's building. The EyEvent, a major fundraising gala, is now in its fifth year. The Eye-Cee event, a continuing education program for eye care professionals is also in its fifth year. And the most recent addition is The Shop at The Sight Center, a new retail space set up within a simulated apartment, which showcases low vision devices, talking products, and handy gadgets that maximize independence for people who are blind or visually impaired.

Additionally Ms. Scroggs successfully led the Board and organization through a major leadership transition, which included the retirement of long-time Executive Director Dawn Christensen, the

Stocked full of magnifiers, specialty lamps, handy gadgets, high-tech devices, talking products, and so much more, The Shop quickly became a destination for many who live with permanent vision loss.



We soon learned that the door to The Shop didn't simply lead to products. It also led to hope. As people began to drop in to buy a magnifier for mom, a talking clock for dad, or a new tip for their own white cane, they started to see all the possibilities and options that people with permanent vision loss have available to them. A simple transaction often led to a broader conversation about how others are working, learning, playing, and living without the sight most people take for granted.

Since The Shop is located inside The Sight Center, customers can tap into the collective experience, knowledge and compassion of The Sight Center staff. These dedicated "Shopkeepers" can help turn a needle-threader and magnifier into a renewed passion for needlepoint, and a talking meat thermometer can

be the spark to ignite the dormant flames of a former chef.

Located in a simulated apartment, The Shop offers products which can be tested in real-life settings and demonstrated on actual household devices. The Sight Center staff who work in The Shop have become trusted resources for many clients looking for creative solutions to everyday challenges.

# **State Forced to Cut Homemaker Program**

### The Sight Center Responds to the Challenge

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) was signed into law in the summer of 2014 by President Obama. Once the WIOA regulations were finalized, Ohio's Bureau of Services for the Visually Impaired (BSVI) determined that it will no longer be able to continue the longstanding Homemaker Program. This popular program, which has been in place for decades, provided services for people age 55 and under who are not vocationally oriented and who serve as the primary homemaker.

Through this state program, The Sight Center has helped provide rehabilitation therapy, mobility training, and assistive technology services to more than 36 residents in 2015 alone. Amy Rhoads is an example of the program's impact.

Diagnosed at age 7 with a degenerative eye condition called Rod-Cone Dystrophy, Amy eventually lost nearly all of her sight along with her confidence and independence. Through the Homemaker Program, The Sight Center empowered Amy to adapt to her new reality by showing her different ways to cook, clean, do laundry, and stay organized without her sight. Today, Amy home schools her son, maintains the family calendar, prepares shopping lists, and is once again exploring her passion for cooking and baking.

In response to the new challenge, The Sight Center will focus its recently created Empowerment Fund on the target of continuing to provide homemaker services. Money raised during the 5th Annual EyEvent on April 27 will be designated for this purpose.

Stacey Butts, Executive Director of The Sight Center, said "The elimination of the state's Homemaker Program will not decrease the demand for these services." Alluding to the agency mission, she added that "We will do whatever it takes to continue empowering independence for people who are blind or visually impaired."

# Joe Nauman Receives First Fatima Shousher Educational Award

On January 19, the first Fatima H. Shousher Educational Fund Award was presented to Joe Nauman, a junior at Bowling Green State University. Mr. Nauman, an Eastwood High School graduate and Luckey resident, was selected for the combination of his academic credentials, volunteer service, athletic achievements, community involvement, and a strong determination to live independently with a vision impairment. Born with Optic Nerve Hypoplasia, a medical condition arising from the underdevelopment of the optic nerve, Joe aspires

to become an intervention specialist and special education instructor. He is committed to being a strong advocate for his future students to ensure they have the accommodations they need to succeed. In his free time, Joe volunteers at Eastwood High School as the assistant wrestling coach and is a certified Ohio High School Athletic Association official for the sport of wrestling.

The Fatima H. Shousher Educational Fund, created in honor of Fatima Shousher, educator, advocate and role model for visually impaired students in the Toledo Public School District and throughout Northwest Ohio, was established in 2014 by her family as a tribute to her personal life and professional career. Born with a vision impairment and diagnosed with Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) as a teenager, Fatima has never allowed her vision loss to deter her from achieving her goals in life. In 1989, Ms. Shousher began her career with Toledo Public Schools where she has served as primary educator, resource instructor, advocate and role model. The majority of her career has been at Rogers High School where she has focused on the academic needs of students with severe vision impairments.

Stacey Butts, Executive Director of The Sight Center, says, "Future students will benefit from the newly created Educational Fund as well as from Fatima's integrity, knowledge, and passion for limitless options regardless of visual ability."
