


# **New Caregiver Program**

### 10 Counties Benefit From New Services for Older Adults

The Sight Center is pleased to announce new services that benefit older adults in ten (10) northwest Ohio counties. The services target two primary groups: caregivers of older adults who are visually impaired and older adults who are caregivers for grandchildren or young relatives with



vision impairments. Thanks to funding from the Family Caregiver Support Program of the Area Office on Aging – Toledo District, residents of Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams, and Wood Counties are eligible for these new individualized and group services.

The individualized services available through the Family Caregiver Support Program can include:

- Low vision home modifications lighting, contrast and addition of tactile enhancements
- Adaptive daily living skills pouring, eating, clothing care, etc.
- Sighted guide training techniques to reinforce travel safety
- Assistive technology tips to make existing home computer systems accessible

As recognized in the Older Americans Act, eligible participants for the new services include:

 Adult family members or other caregivers caring for individuals 60 and older who are visually impaired



- Adult family members or other caregivers providing care to individuals of any age with Alzheimer's disease and low vision
- Grandparents and other relatives (not parents) age 55+ providing care to children or adults who are blind or visually impaired

Additionally, The Sight Center will offer support groups in each part of the region to share information about available services, help caregivers access the available services, and identify the need for individualized caregiver training.

# Let Me Tell You A Story

### A client finds his voice after losing his sight

"Losing my sight was the best thing that ever happened to me," said Michael McArthur. This Toledo resident and former Sight Center client was only somewhat serious when he uttered those words at the Lions Club Christmas party in December.

Michael, who has a background in sales promotion and marketing dating back to the 1970s, had been a frequent public speaker. His topics included "The Serious Business of Being Funny," a talk about improving the effectiveness of business communications by sprinkling in some appropriate instances of humor.

In 2003, Michael was diagnosed with diabetic retinopathy which is the leading cause of permanent vision loss in the country. He underwent a number of laser and surgical treatments to address the symptoms. In 2008, a detached retina left him with seriously impaired vision in his right eye. In 2011, he turned in his driver's license and began receiving disability insurance from the Social Security Administration.

On two occasions, The Sight Center provided assistance to Michael in the form of equipment and training. He has received hand held and desktop magnifiers in addition to valuable instruction in homemaking and occupational skills. He also learned new computer skills which he calls "life changing."

In one memorable visit, Michael recalled The Sight Center occupational therapist working with him to label his stove. Using a



dab of brightly colored fingernail polish, she marked the simmer location on the burner dials. Since services were tailored to Michael's needs and lifestyle, she also marked two important settings on the oven dial - 350-degrees to bake a pizza and 250-degrees to reheat it. Recalling a humorous anecdote which resulted from that visit, Michael said, "She left the nail polish for me to use elsewhere, which raise some questions when my brother visited later that day!"

Energized by his new-found confidence, Michael joined the Westgate Toastmasters Club in 2013 to rekindle his love for public speaking. Thanks to the assistance and training he received from The Sight Center, Michael remains an active member of the Toastmasters group.

So, while losing his sight may not have truly been the best thing that ever happened to him, it did force Michael McArthur to take a closer look at his life. Today, Michael's diabetic condition is under control, his vision is stable, and he is enjoying life. He continues to find joy in storytelling and public speaking. In recognition of the impact The Sight Center has had on his life, Michael has offered to share his story for community presentations.

Sight Center Takes First Steps with NIB

When The Sight Center was established in 1923 as the Toledo Society for the Blind, one role for the new agency was to provide sheltered employment opportunities for Toledo residents who



In February 2017, The Sight Center's application with NIB was approved, beginning the process that will ultimately lead to a local "industry" which will be comprised of at least 75% people with vision impairments.



One goal of this new endeavor is to bring more competitive employment and advancement opportunities to people who are blind or visually impaired while providing The Sight Center with another way to support mission-driven services. The importance of this type of project is highlighted by the fact that unemployment rates for people who live with permanent vision loss is significantly higher than average. Only 40% of working age adults with a significant vision loss are employed, according to the National Federation for the Blind.

The Sight Center will soon begin accepting applications and inquiries from anyone interested in this emerging opportunity. Look for more information to be coming in the near future.

## Wake Up to the Facts About Non-24

Non-24 is the common name for Non-24-Hour Sleep-Wake Disorder, a serious chronic disorder that disrupts a person's circadian rhythms. Everyone has an internal circadian clock, or body clock, that runs a little longer than 24 hours. For sighted people, it is reset everyday by environmental light cues. For people who are visually impaired, totally blind or unable to perceive light, the body clock and sleep-wake cycle can become out of sync with the 24-hour day-night cycle. People who have Non-24 experience a constant daily shift in the times when their body expects to sleep and be awake. Up to 70% of people who are totally blind have Non-24 and may not even know it.



Without light cues, people living with Non-24 may have trouble falling asleep, staying asleep, or may wake up groggy. They may also experience a strong urge to sleep during the day or have sleep patterns that are different from other people. It's important for those who experience these symptoms to speak with their doctor.

One company taking on Non-24 is Vanda Pharmaceuticals Inc. Vanda is a biopharmaceutical company focused on providing solutions to unmet medical needs, such as Non-24. In 2015 the company received the Helen Keller Award from the American Foundation for the Blind, which celebrates individuals and organizations that have demonstrated outstanding achievement in improving the quality of life for people with vision loss. In addition to pharmaceutical research, Vanda also conducts educational programs about Non-24 by an educator and a patient advocate. These programs provide information about the biology and symptoms of Non-24 while providing participants a chance to join a comprehensive program with personalized information and resources.
