

# Walk By Faith, Not By Sight

### Sister Linda's Light Shines Brightly in the Darkness

Many of us remember Sister Linda Maria Pelagio (photo right with WTOL Meteorologist Chris Vickers) from the inspired invocations she delivered before the last two Sight Center Dining in the Dark galas. But few of us know the journey this Philippine-born member of the Sisters of Notre Dame made to become a source of hope for countless people, including many who are blind or sight impaired.

Born in the Philippines, young Linda Pelagio was blinded by a severe reaction to penicillin at the age of six. While attending school, she became fascinated with a teacher who was a nun, and hoped that one day she could become like this holy woman. Her grandmother told her that if she wanted to be a holy sister, she must pray every day, saying "if you are called, you must trust in God."

In 1987, she travelled to the United States to participate in an international blindness conference in Missouri. This led her to the

Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind where she was encouraged to pursue her dream. She applied to 16 Catholic religious communities to become a nun, but only one, the Sisters of Notre Dame in Toledo, Ohio, welcomed her to join their order.

While serving in her first ministry as a Notre Dame sister at the Kateri Center, Sister Linda was also earning a Master's degree at the University of Toledo. Since her keyboarding skills were not strong enough she was referred to The Sight Center where she quickly became a proficient typist. She also received occupational therapy, daily living instruction and training on using household appliances and braille writing devices.

In 1989, she helped start a support group for people who are visually impaired known as InnerVision. The goal was to provide spiritual enrichment, social activities and educational opportunities in an ecumenical environment. Over the years, the membership has grown to as many as 80. Sister Linda said that the name came from their feeling that "we may have lost our sight, but we will never lose our inner vision." The group continues to meet monthly at the offices of the Diocese of Toledo.

Through her years of service to numerous local social service organizations, Sister Linda has relied on The Sight Center for everything electronic. "They are a great resource for computer training," she said, adding, "When I am stuck with my smart phone, they help me through it. All of my electronic skills came from the people at The Sight Center."

In spite of her vision loss, or possibly because of it, Sister Linda's light shines brighter than ever. Whether she's attending an InnerVision meeting, counselling families in the Mercy St. Vincent Hospital Spiritual Care Center or meeting with residents in the John H. McKissick senior apartment complex in South Toledo, Sister Linda Pelagio keeps doing what she's been doing her entire life - walking by faith, not by sight.

### The Only Thing To Fear Is Fear Itself Vision Rehabilitation Can Defeat Fear of Blindness

# **HOPE** FEAR

We all treasure our health. No one wants to consider a possible loss of vitality. In fact, fearing such a possibility, people may deny changes, shy away from doctors or skip medical screenings.

For many, the fear of vision loss is among their greatest health concerns. The results of a recent poll with 2044 diverse respondents, "ranked losing vision as equal to or worse than losing hearing, memory, speech, or a limb." This is not an irrational concern. As our population ages, cases of age-related diseases affecting vision are expected to double by 2050 affecting an estimated 27 million or more. Also, children and young adults are not immune to disease or accidents which cause low vision or blindness.

At the heart of many fears is the unknown. The Sight Center is driven by mission to help ease fears by connecting people to information and resources that reduce uncertainty. Consider these facts:

- Vision rehabilitation can help visually impaired people attain maximum function, a sense of well-being, a satisfying level of independence, and optimum quality of life.
- Vision rehabilitation is most effective when begun early in the process of vision loss. Both the American Academy of Ophthalmology and the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention assert the importance of early intervention.
- The Site Center provides individualized vision rehabilitation services ranging from low vision evaluations to white cane training, assistive technology support, daily living skills and home safety enhancements. These intensive services, most of which are provided in a client's own home, teach lifelong skills that empower independence in people who have permanently lost much or all of their sight.

Each year The Sight Center provides vision rehabilitation to thousands of people of all ages who live with permanent vision loss. Some are totally blind while others are considered legally blind or visually impaired. Some have lived their entire life with their condition while others are having to adjust to their new reality after a lifetime of perfect vision. The agency enriches the lives of thousands more annually who receive relevant news, call for resource information, seek caregiver advice or find low-vision solutions in The Shop at The Sight Center.

# **Dr. Goulding Announces Retirement** *The Sight Center Optometrist Leaving Lasting Legacy*



After 50 years as a practicing optometrist, including 16 years as the Low-Vision Specialist for The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio, Dr. Robert Goulding has decided to hang up his ophthalmoscope at the end of this year. While the number of patients he has seen can be counted, the impact on their lives cannot. "It's hard to measure independence and quality of life" said Executive Director Stacey Butts, adding "but that's what Dr. Goulding has been giving patients his entire career."

His contributions to the worlds of vision and low vision extend far beyond the exam room. Dr. Goulding has been an active member of the Lions Club since 1988, served 13 years on the committee for Prevention of Blindness, taken multiple mission trips to Mexico delivering free eye services and glasses to people who could not otherwise afford eye care, and has been the promotor and chair of the Children's Blind Fishing program for over 10 years.

In 2014 he received The Sight Center's highest honor, the John Goerlich Award for Distinguished Service, which recognizes a person who has served the blind and visually impaired community unselfishly. "We'll miss seeing Dr. Goulding every week" said Stacey, "but we do hope to keep him involved in the work we do."

### **Raising Cane In Ohio Statehouse**

### The Sight Center Joins Effort For Medicaid Inclusion of White Canes

In June 2018, leaders from The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio, the Cleveland Sight Center and the Cincinnati Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired testified before the Ohio House of Representatives' Health Committee in support of Ohio House Bill 587. This bill would require Medicaid to treat white canes for the visually impaired as durable medical equipment, removing a decade's old exemption for the mobility device which empowers independence for those with vision loss. This bill has garnered bi-partisan support and is currently being reviewed by the House Health Committee.
